

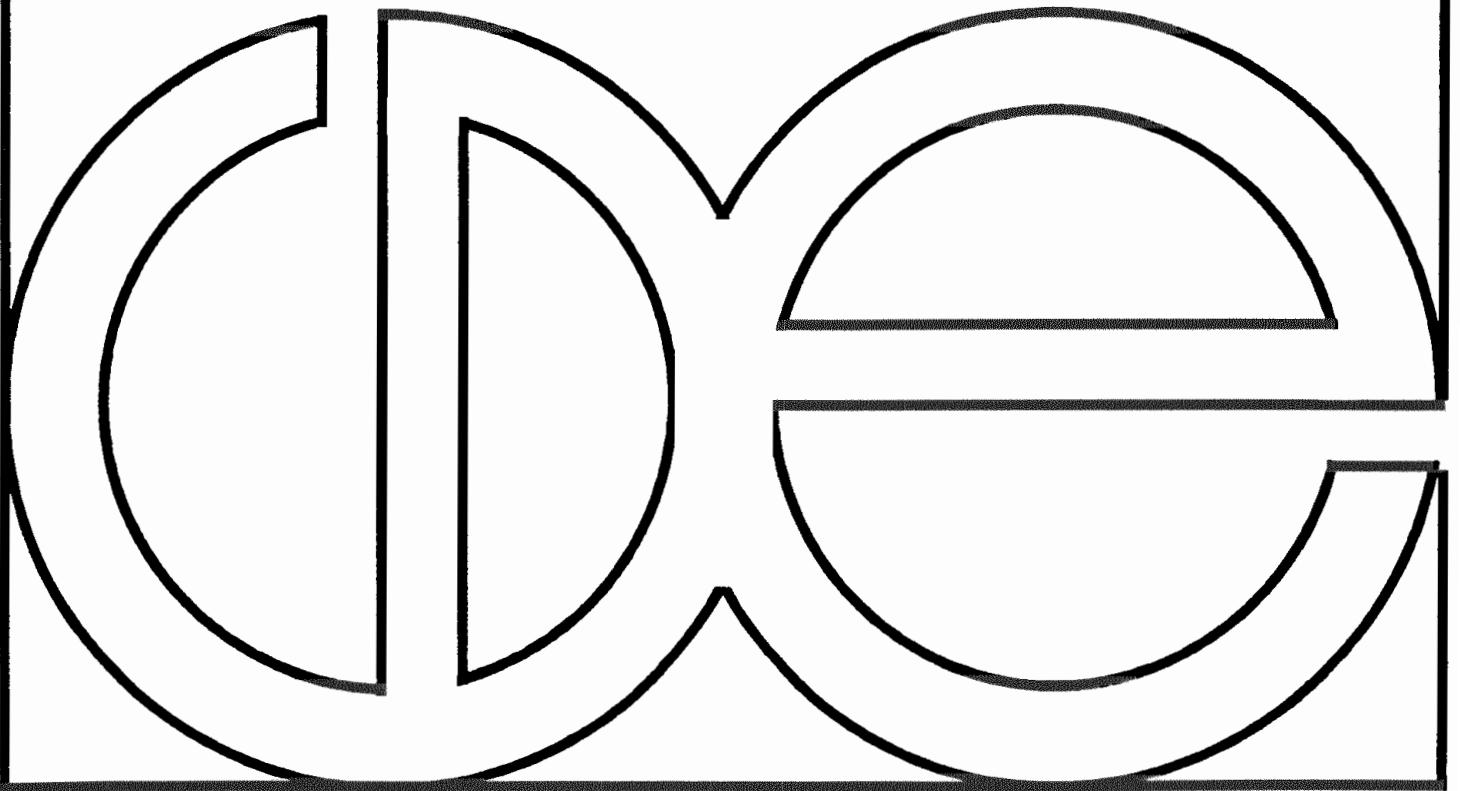

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INTRODUCTION

This revised and enlarged list of pre-1946 United States Census publication holdings of the Center for Demography and Ecology Library supersedes CDE Working Paper 92-15, April 1992.

The list of pre-1946 United States Census publication holdings of the Center for Demography and Ecology Library is an attempt to provide a bibliography that can be used to facilitate research by users of the Center. Until now, the publications identified here have been somewhat inaccessible due to a lack of adequate documentation.

The list was compiled by matching all of our holdings to the items in the Catalog of United States Census Publications 1790-1945 prepared by Henry J. Dubester, Chief, Census Library Project. The "Dubester" catalog is a comprehensive list of all publications issued by the Bureau of the Census between 1790 and 1945. All citations are given a unique identifying number.

This list uses the same numbers as the "Dubester" catalog. Those appearing in bold type indicate our actual holdings. Numbers that do not appear in bold type indicate titles of a series of publications; any items within the series which are owned by CDE are in boldface.

The "Dubester" catalog only lists publications up until December 31, 1945. U.S. Census publications issued after that date have been recorded in the Catalog of Publications: 1946-1972 and since 1973 in the annual issue of Catalog and Subject Guide.

Most publications listed here can be found on our Census shelves in "Dubester" numerical order. Statistical Abstract of the United States can be found in our Reference Material section and all publications dealing with vital statistics can be found on our Vital Statistics shelves.

FIFTH DECENNIAL CENSUS: 1830

- This edition of the Abstract contains discrepancies in the results compared to those returned in the Abstract cited above and in the final report of the Fifth Census . . . as well as discrepancies between the totals in some of the State tables and totals in the summary table for the United States.

SIXTH DECENNIAL CENSUS: 1840

Deaf and dumb, blind, insane, and idiotic; 7. Colleges, academies, schools, etc.; 8. Attending school during year, as returned by families; 9. Adults in the State who cannot read and write; 10. Professions, occupations, and trades of the male population; 11. Agriculture--farms and implements, stock products, home manufactures, etc.; 12. Newspapers and periodicals; 13. Libraries, other than private; and 14. Churches, church property, etc.

This last part summarizes the results of the census by States, and counties and includes an alphabetical list of the cities, towns, townships, etc., showing county, district or parish and State in which located together with total population in 1850. Also: Appendix--California State Census of 1852; age and sex of the white and free colored population in the leading Northern and Northwestern cities, and in the leading cities of the slaveholding States; nativities of the inhabitants in the leading cities of the United States; and ages of persons who died between June 1, 1849, and June 1, 1850.

EIGHTH DECENNIAL CENSUS: 1860

Population by color and sex of cities and towns and other subdivisions; 4. Free population, native and foreign, by counties; 5. Nativities of the free population; 6. Occupations. A final section recapitulates these data and in addition to the subjects already mentioned includes tables on the nativity of the free population in several large cities (Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, and New Orleans), and data on the deaf and dumb, the blind, and the insane by age and nativity. Also: Appendix--"Deaf and dumb. Authors and books," and "The blind. Persons in America and Europe who have devoted special attention to the interests of the blind."

Mortality statistics include deaths in the year ending June 1, 1860 by States and districts according to age, sex, month, and disease. Extensive analytic commentary with text tables also included. Miscellaneous statistics include: Banks and insurance, value of real and personal estate, public press, railroads, canal and river improvements, manumission of slaves and fugitive slaves, change of area, number of families and free population, churches, education (number of institutions and school attendance), libraries, taxes, pauperism and crime and wages, persons living over 100 years, average rate of mortality, and fisheries.

Bulletins" (See nos. 358 to 443.)

Each chapter consists of an introduction and analysis, and a section of principal tables. Volume I includes an appendix--Form of schedule for the enumeration of population.
- 313 [Vol. II] Population, 1910. Reports by States, with statistics for counties, cities and other civil divisions--Alabama-Montana. 1913. 1160 p.
The material for each State is divided into two chapters: 1. Number of inhabitants; and 2. Composition and characteristics of the population. This volume incorporates the two advance series of population bulletins. (See nos. 358-359). Data are given under the several headings of topics included in the list of separates to Volume I, except for statistics on inability to speak English and ownership of homes.

Statistics of occupations are given for the gainfully employed population 10 years of age and over. The volume includes a summary and general analysis of results which describe the number of gainfully employed as compared with the total population and according to sex, age, geographical distribution; and presents detailed tables of the gainfully employed in the United States according to a detailed list of occupations by sex, age, color or race, nativity, and parentage; of the gainfully employed in States according to an abbreviated list

of occupations by sex, age, color or race, nativity; and of gainfully employed in States and cities of 100,000 or more inhabitants, and cities of 25,000 to 100,000 inhabitants according to an abbreviated list of occupations and sex.

Volume V includes two appendices: Appendix A-- Physical features and soils of the United States, and Appendix B--Copies of schedules and instructions.

The material for each State includes an analysis and a series of tables comprising the advance bulletins for agriculture. The data cover number of farms and farm property; number, acreage, and value of farms classified by tenure, color and nativity of farmers and mortgage debt; livestock products, and domestic animals sold or slaughtered on farms, value of all crops and principal classes thereof, and acreage and production of principal crops; selected farm expenses and receipts; and domestic animals not on farms--all by counties.

Comparative summary for 1909, 1904, and 1899; 2. Detailed statement for the State, by industries: 1909; and 3. Detailed statement for cities: 1909. Also "Index of cities."

This volume comprises the series of advance manufactures bulletins for individual industries. For detailed list of industries see no. 393.

This report presents statistics for native white and Negro women by number of children ever born and duration of marriage in relation to such social and economic characteristics as urban and rural residence, age of woman, education, employment status and major occupation group of husband; and supplementary tables with data showing detailed marital status of native white and Negro women, childless and mothers (by age) with total children ever born.
- 983** Women by number of children under 5 years old. 1945. ix, 265 p.
This report presents statistics on the fertility of native white and Negro women 15 to 49 years old in the United States, according to social and economic

characteristics of the woman and her family. Women are classified by number of children under 5 years old and by age in relation to marital status parentage, education (last full grade of school completed) migration, birthplace, employment status, and tenure and monthly rental value of home. Women married once are also classified by relationship to the head of the household, occupation of husband, education of husband, and birthplace of husband. Statistics are presented for the United States by regions, urban and rural.

986 Educational attainment of children by rental value of home. 1945. iv, 50 p.

This report is based on tabulations of a 5-percent sample of the population returns for native white and Negro children 7 to 17 years old. It presents statistics showing the relationship between the economic status of the family, as measured by monthly rental value of the home, and educational attainment, as indicated by highest grade of school completed.

988 . . . Population. Estimates of labor force, employment, and unemployment in the United States, 1940 and 1930. 1944. vi, 18 p.

This report is designed to provide a basis for comparison of labor force statistics of the 1930 and 1940 censuses, by age, and sex. In addition it provides a classification of persons in the labor force by employment status, for use in studying trends in employment and unemployment, and the incidence of unemployment by age and sex. A description in detail of processes by which the

estimates and adjustments were made is also included.

Statistics on these subjects are presented for families classified according to family composition, that is, by sex and marital status of the family head and the number of children and other persons in the family; and according to color, age, and major occupation group of the family head.

Additional subjects shown for urban and rural-nonfarm areas include number of residential structures, average monthly rent or rental value of dwelling units, and mortgage status of owner-occupied nonfarm units; and for rural-farm areas additional information is shown concerning electric lighting, running water, and toilet facilities.

- 1034** . . . Housing. Index of reports. 1945. v, 127 p.
This index presents a classification of data and cross-tabulations of data, assembled in the four volumes of reports on Housing and in the related reports. There are four appendixes: Appendix A--Urban places for which various types of housing data are available; Appendix B--Urban places of 50,000 inhabitants or more for which various types of housing data are available; Appendix C--Metropolitan districts for which various types of housing data are available; and Appendix D--Regions, divisions, and States for which various types of housing data are available.

This report is based on the tabulations of samples of the census returns of families and their heads. Heads of families are shown by race, nativity, parentage, citizenship, sex, marital status, age, highest grade of school completed, migration status and 1935 residence, employment status, and major occupation group.

Characteristics of urban and rural-nonfarm families and heads of families are shown in relation to monthly rent and family wage or salary income and receipt of other income in 1939. Heads of families are shown by sex, marital status (of male head), employment status, and major occupation group. Families are classified by size, number of children under 21 years old, and number of persons in the labor force. Dwelling units are classified by number of rooms and state of repair and plumbing equipment. Statistics for cities of 1,000,000 or more are not shown in this report.

1039 . . . Population and housing. Families. Tenure and rent. Regions, cities of 1,000,000 or more, and metropolitan districts of 500,000 or more. 1943. iv, 141 p.

This report is based on the tabulation of a sample of the census returns. Characteristics of urban and rural-nonfarm families and heads of families are shown in relation to the tenure and monthly rent of the dwelling units occupied by the families. Families are classified by size, number of children under 21 years old, number of lodgers and subfamilies, number of persons in the labor force, number of employed workers, class-of-worker composition, family employment status, family wage or salary income, and receipt of other income. Heads of families are shown by race, nativity, citizenship, sex, and marital status, age, employment status, major occupation group, migration status, and residence of migrants in 1935.

1121 . . . Puerto Rico. Bulletin no. 4. Migration between municipalities. 1946. iv, 81 p.

This bulletin presents statistics on the internal migration of the population, that is, the movement from one municipality to another, or from one region to another. Migrants are classified by place of origin (residence in 1935) and destination (place of residence in 1940). Migrants are further classified by type, and both nonmigrants and migrants are classified by such general characteristics as sex, age, color, employment status, occupation, and family relationship.

1135 . . . United States life tables and actuarial tables 1939-1941, by Thomas N.E. Greville, Actuarial mathematician. 1946. iv, 153 p.

The life tables in this volume are based on the 1940 Census of Population and the deaths of the 3-year period 1939-1941. Separate life tables have been prepared for each sex for each of three racial groups: White, Negro, and other races. Life tables are also included for the total population of each sex, for the total population of each racial group without distinction by sex, and for the entire population without distinction by race or sex. Each of the 12 life tables is based on data for the entire continental United States. Also included are certain actuarial tables derived from the life tables for white males, white females, and total whites, to be used in calculating premiums and values for life annuities, life assurances, and other monetary benefits contingent on death or survival. Other sections give a brief synopsis of the elementary mathematical theory of life contingencies, including those involving more than one life; instructions for using the actuarial tables, with numerical examples; and a complete account of the methods and processes used in constructing the life tables.

1136 . . . Vital statistics rates in the United States, 1900-1940. By Forrest E. Linder, Assistant chief statistician for vital statistics and Robert C. Grove, Social science analyst. 1943. vii, 1051 p.

This volume contains a discussion of the basic qualifying factors of vital statistics, comments on the definition and interpretation of crude and specific rates, critique and survey of the literature dealing with various mortality indexes, detailed time-trend tables of mortality and natality, birth and death data for States and smaller geographic areas for 1940 based on data tabulated by place of residence, and population estimates on which all crude and specific rates are based.

Separate text and tabular sections are presented for the blind and the deaf. Results for the blind pertain to their number, sex, distribution by States and Territories, color, nativity of the blind whites, age, age when blindness occurred, causes of blindness, marital status, consanguinity of parents and blind relatives, school attendance, occupations, and the blind-deaf. Results for the deaf pertain to their number, age or period of life when deafness occurred, comparisons with results of former censuses, geographic distribution, degree of deafness, ability to speak, correlated conditions, condition of speech naturally resulting from deafness contrasted with actual condition revealed by census returns, ability to read lips, usual means of communication, sex, race, nativity of whites, causes of deafness, consanguinity of parents, deaf relatives, present age, marital status, school attendance, and occupations.
- 1482** The blind in the United States, 1910. 1917. 342 p.
A special schedule asking for detailed information in addition to that called for by the general population schedule was sent out to every person reported as blind by the population enumerators. This report is divided into four sections, the first of which discusses the returns for the blind as tabulated from the general population schedule, the second of which discusses the returns from the special schedules. The first section considers blindness in relation to geographic distribution, blindness in cities, sex, age, race and nativity, country of birth of foreign-born whites, marital status, occupations, the blind in institutions, and in the Territories of Hawaii and Puerto Rico. The second section discusses geographic distribution of population returning special schedules, age when vision was lost, cause of blindness, heredity and blindness, education, use of raised type, occupations and economic status, occupation before blindness, and blind mutes. There are 46 general tables followed by section 4, "Summary of State laws relative to the blind and the prevention of

blindness," and four appendixes: A. Institutions for the blind in the United States; B. Special schedules employed at Censuses of the blind in the United States; C. Special schedules employed in enumerating the blind in foreign countries; and D. Movement for the improvement and standardization of statistics of the blind.

1483 Deaf-mutes in the United States. Analysis of the Census of 1910 with summary of State laws relative to the deaf as of January 1, 1918. 221 p.

A special schedule asking for detailed information in addition to that called for by the general population schedule was sent out to every person reported as deaf and dumb by the population enumerators. The analysis and tabular material in this report pertain only to those individuals for whom special schedules were returned (50.3 percent of the total reported deaf and dumb). The discussion and tables pertain to number, geographic distribution, sex, race and nativity, country of birth of foreign-born white deaf-mutes, age, marital status, age when hearing was lost, cause of deafness, heredity and deafness, education, means of communication and ability to read lips, occupations and economic status, blind deaf-mutes, and comparisons with foreign countries. The tables are followed by a Summary of State laws relative to the deaf, and three appendixes: A. Institutions for the deaf in the United States; B. Special schedules employed at censuses of the deaf and the deaf and dumb in the United States; and C. Special schedules employed in enumerating the deaf and dumb in foreign countries.

1491 Prisoners and juvenile delinquents in the United States, 1910. 1918. 535 p.

The extended text commences with an introduction describing the scope of the census, significance of data, historical review, prison population, prison commitments, class of institution, and movement of prison population. This is followed by treatment of the following subjects: Offense, sentence, sentence and offense, age, sex, race, nativity, country of birth, native and foreign parentage, marital status, literacy, occupations, and juvenile offenders. The text is followed by 119 detailed tables with data on these subjects.

1513 Benevolent institutions, 1910. 1913. 411 p.

This report contains statistics relating to institutions for the care of children, societies for the protection and care of children, homes for the care of adults or adults and children, hospitals and sanatariums, dispensaries, and institutions for the blind and deaf, showing the name, location, and supervisory agency of each institution for which data were secured and the class of inmates received by each, the movement of institutional population, the number of employees, and certain statistics pertaining to equipment, financial transactions, and property valuations. The several types of institutions are described in a textual section followed by six general tables which present data for each type of institution by States.

1515 Paupers in almshouses, 1910. 1915. 141 p.

A brief description of results; an introduction describing the method and scope of inquiry, census results prior to 1904, and summary of poor laws are followed by an analysis of the statistics as to number of paupers, age, sex, race, nativity, parentage, immigrant paupers, native and foreign parentage, Negro paupers, marital status, fertility of pauper women, children in almshouses, literacy, length of stay in almshouse, number of previous admissions, occupation prior to admission, capacity for work, defective paupers, paupers discharged and death among paupers. This analysis is followed by 48 detailed tables with statistics for these characteristics.

1522 Insane and feeble-minded in institutions, 1910. 1914. 217 p.

As in the Census of 1904, the 1910 enumeration was restricted to the insane and feeble-minded in hospitals and institutions. The report is divided into separate sections for the insane in hospitals and feeble-minded in institutions. In each section an analytic text describes the procedures of the census together with retrospective summaries, the data obtained, followed by general tables. The extensive analysis of insane in hospitals includes comparison by States, age, race and nativity, insanity among immigrants, insanity among Negroes, native and foreign parentage, sex, illiteracy, marital status, occupations, city and country, general paralysis and alcoholic psychosis, length of time in hospitals, duration of present attack, previous admissions, discharges, and deaths. Data are presented for individual institutions, by

States. There is also a Summary of laws relative to the care of the insane. The more restricted discussion relative to the feeble-minded in institutions has reference to States and geographic divisions, comparisons between the 1910 and 1904 results, age race and nativity, sex, physically defective feeble-minded, discharges, and deaths.

Continues the annual series of reports published in Bulletins 20, 45, and 50, the last mentioned with financial statistics for cities of 30,000 and over (cited above). The report covering the year 1905 includes statistics relating to subjects other than finance as does to a more limited extent the report for 1907. The 1906 report includes discussion of the problems involved in securing uniform municipal reports and both the 1906 and 1907 reports contain appendixes devoted to uniform system of accounting for water-supply systems. The four reports contain detailed statistics concerning the financial transactions of cities, their indebtedness and assets and the assessed valuation of taxed property. An "Abstract of Annual Report, Statistics of Cities 1907" was issued in Bulletin 105.

1660 Financial statistics of cities having a population of over 30,000: 1915. 1916. 338 p., 1918. 1919. 357 p., and 1921. 1922. 157 p. editions of 1909 [-1931] 1913-1934.

The reports for the years 1909-1911 inclusive were issued in the series of "Special Reports." Although a direct continuation of the annual reports commencing with the report for the years 1902 and 1903 covering cities of 25,000 or more inhabitants (Bulletin 20), the report for 1909 and those following are limited to financial statistics exclusively. The general statistics of cities previously included in the annual series were published in separate reports covering the years 1909, 1915, and 1916. (See nos. 1674-1676). Preliminary reports for the years 1912, 1913, and 1915 were issued in Bulletins 118, 126 and 132 respectively. No reports were issued for the years 1914 and 1920. Although the contents of the individual reports vary, they generally include the following subjects: 1. Total and per capita receipts from revenues and from the principal classes thereof; 2. Limited information on religious bodies was first published in the Census report for 1850 (See no. 30) and similar information was included in the reports for 1860, 1870, and 1890, (See nos. 40, 45, and 201) so that the present report, representing conditions as near as may be, at the close of the year 1906, constitutes the fifth collection and publication of these statistics through the agency of the Census. (p. 7)

2901 Part 1. Summary and general tables. 576 p.

A summary section with explanatory text and text tables presenting statistics for the continental United States, for States and Territories, and for cities (religious organizations; communicants or members according to number and sex; number of church edifices, seating capacity, value of and debt on church property, and value of parsonage; Sunday schools; ministers--number, ratio of organizations and communicants or members to ministers, average annual salaries; date of establishment of religious organizations; languages used in the conduct of church services; work of denominations in domestic and foreign fields; statistics of colored organizations) followed by 15 general tables and 9 diagrams.

The schedule inquiries of 1916 did not differ greatly from those of 1906. The inquiry as to seating capacity of church edifices was omitted in 1916 and a separate schedule was used for ministers.

No inquiry was made as to the sex of Sunday school scholars or the number who were church members. No. 66 combines issues for 1944-1945. Successive numbers also issued in the Congressional series of house documents. The first edition of "Statistical Abstract," issued in 1878, contained for the most part statistics of the Treasury Department including such data as revenue, banking and currency, coinage, foreign trade, immigration, and shipping. Statistics were also presented for alien population, postal service, railroads, agriculture, and coal. The scope of the publication was broadened during successive editions. Its present coverage was assumed in about 1943 when the following sections were included: Area and population; vital statistics (including health and medical care); crime and criminals; immigration, emigration, and naturalization; labor force (including employment, hours, and earnings); military and civil service; social security; education; elections; national government finances; State and local government finances and employment; banking and finance; income and expenditures; prices; communications systems (including postal service); power; public roads and motor vehicles; transportation, air and land--steam and electric railways, express companies, motorbusses, and civil aeronautics; waterways, water traffic and shipping; foreign commerce of the United States; commerce of noncontiguous territories; irrigation and drainage; farms--general statistics; farm production and related statistics; farm animals and animal products; farm crops and foodstuffs; forests and forest products; fisheries; mining and mineral products; manufactures; distribution, services, and hotels; construction and housing; climate; and public lands. Source notes accompanying tables and a bibliography provide reference to publications containing more detailed discussions of terms and concepts as well as more detailed statistical data.

Between 1915 and 1921 the successive issues manifested expanding scope of tabulations. The period 1922-1936 was one of fairly uniform presentation of returns. Introductory text materials included separate sections devoted to births, stillbirths, and infant mortality. Summary and rate tables were followed by general tables which presented births according to month; sex; color; parent nativity of white; sex; color, and age of mother; and birth order with some cross-classifications among these characteristics. Plural births and plural stillbirths included tabulation of number by sex, color, and for white by country of birth of mother. Beginning in 1922 stillbirths were tabulated by color, sex, parent nativity of white, age of parents, birth order, cause, and period of uterogestation. Infant deaths are given by cause, sex, color, and subdivisions of first year of life. The data are cross-classified among these characteristics and are given variously for States, cities, and rural districts. Statistics for Hawaii (1929-1936) and the Virgin Islands (1925-1936) are given in a supplemental section. Infant mortality statistics of selected foreign countries are included in the reports with variations in tabulations. The series was continued by the Vital Statistics of the United States. Natality and mortality data for the United States, tabulated by place of residence. A supplement was issued for the 1939-1940 reports with subtitle: Part 3. Natality and mortality data for counties and cities in the United States tabulated by place of residence, 2-year totals, 1939-1940. In the issues of recent years the second part, which tabulates vital statistics according to place of residence, contain the more detailed tabulations. In both parts, however, births, plural births, deaths, infant deaths, and stillbirths are classified by the several characteristics described in the two preceding series and are tabulated on a similar geographic basis. Part 1 of the report for the year 1944 has appendix--International statistics which reports births, deaths, infant deaths, and stillbirths together with rates for specified countries and for selected years, 1920-1944.

The statistics for 1887-1906 were obtained from a survey by the Census Bureau (See Census Bulletin no. 96); in addition, some 1867-1886 data are summarized from an earlier survey by the Commissioner of Labor.

Twenty general tables present data on marriage and divorce. Marriages are tabulated by number according to year (1887 to 1906) and counties by States.

The statistics in this 1916 report were obtained from a survey similar to those described below for 1922 to 1932. An introductory text describes the marriage statistics and includes tables of marriages reported, decennial increase, and rates per 10,000 population by divisions and States in 1916, 1906, 1900 and 1890. Similar presentation is given to divorce statistics with additional discussion concerning such aspects of divorce as to which party granted, causes, contested cases, service of notice, residence of libellee, place of marriage, alimony, and condition as to children. There are eight general tables which classify divorces according to the above mentioned characteristics and include the number of marriages and divorces in 1916 by counties.

3135 Marriage and divorce. 1922-1932. 1925-1934. Holdings: 1922, 1923, 1924, 1926, 1927, 1929, and 1931 editions.

The series of eleven annual reports was discontinued with the report issued for 1932. The statistics included in these reports were secured partly from the records of selected States cooperating with the Census Bureau in the annual survey, and partly from county offices in the remaining States. The reports contain

text and tables pertaining to number of marriages, divorces, and annulments; divorces contested and not contested, by party to whom granted; divorces by cause, duration of marriage, number of children affected; annulments, by cause and duration of marriage; and marriages, divorces, and annulments, by counties.

Life tables were computed for the following populations: White populations in aggregate of twenty-seven States and the District of Columbia, the original registration States, and the separate States of California, Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Utah, Virginia, Washington, and Wisconsin, in aggregate of fourteen cities and for the separate cities of Baltimore, Boston, Buffalo, Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit, Los Angeles, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, San Francisco, and Washington D. C; Negro populations in States with less than 4 percent Negro population, States with more than 5 percent Negro population, twelve large cities, and original registration States; and Hawaiian populations all races combined, and Japanese race.

Email: Sandor@ wiscssc. The purpose of the CDE Library is to serve the research needs of the faculty, staff, and students affiliated with the Center. The CDE Library maintains specialized materials in the area of population studies. The collection consists of 10,000 pieces and includes subscriptions to 260 periodicals. The annual budget for 1991-1992 was \$80,000 dollars. The staff consists of 1 (FTE) professional librarian, .85 (FTE) classified staff position, and .75 (FTE) student position.

For my SLIS course requirement practicum, I chose to identify all of the United States Census publications prior to 1946 held by the CDE Library and to create a bibliography of those holdings. In addition, I planned to evaluate the holdings for consideration of the need to weed or conserve the items. This project consisted of matching the holdings to those items listed in the Catalog of United States Census Publications, 1790-1945. Prepared by Henry J. Dubester, Chief, Census Library Project, the catalog was first published in 1950. The goal of the catalog was to provide a comprehensive list and reference guide to all publications issued by the Bureau of the Census between 1790 and 1945. All were numbered and annotated by Dubester with the exception of some titles.

Over 200 CDE Library Census holdings were identified and their respective "Dubester" number placed on the spine of the item. The number was also pencilled on the title page. Duplicate titles were identified and given to the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. Some items were considered appropriate for binding; they were collated and prepared for binding. Other items published prior to 1900 that are in need of major conservation have not been dealt with because the cost of conservation is prohibitive.

All of the holdings are incorporated into a 55 page bibliography compiled by taking the citations and the annotations which pertained to the CDE Library Census holdings from the "Dubester" catalog and entering this information into a document using Wordperfect.

Although the objectives for the project appear to be straight-forward, I encountered many obstacles that provided me with some unexpected learning experiences. Several times, I believed that I was done with the project only to discover that another Census item existed. This problem arose because some of the CDE Library Census holdings had been cataloged with Library of Congress call numbers and were located with other monographs, while the majority reside in a specific place identified as "Census Shelves." I made the decision to remove these items from the monograph section of the CDE Library and place them with the other Census items. This decision, which was reluctantly agreed to by the CDE Library Director, required going into the card

catalog and changing all of the card sets to reflect the fact that these items were now to be found on the "Census Shelves." In addition to this problem, I learned the hard way that there is a reason to use the "indent" key rather than the "tab" key when creating a Wordperfect document. Other nuances included the fact that the "Dubester" catalog was probably produced in sections; I noted several discrepancies in the style of the citations. For example, in some sections, specific letters were capitalized and in others they were not. The punctuation also differed. I standardized the punctuation in certain cases to maintain my sanity. A final problem that I encountered was that some of the Census publications have been reprinted and are often cited as though original.

The practicum project provided me with many practical applications of tasks that librarians face every day. In addition to the decisions involved with the evaluation of the Census collection, I was able to gain useful experience in mundane areas such as changing the numbers on catalog card sets and labeling books. I also gained experience in weeding, binding, and conservation. The most beneficial aspect of the practicum involved the opportunity to interact with the Library Director and other staff members who encouraged my efforts.

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
